


# Tour Experience

**Jhalana Leopard Reserve:** A Thrilling Safari Adventure India's first leopard reserve, Jhalana Leopard Reserve in Jaipur, Rajasthan, spans 20 square kilometers amid the Aravali hills, home to over 40 leopards including cubs. This hidden gem offers guided jeep safaris through diverse habitats, where elusive leopards thrive as apex predators. Our three-day journey captured the raw excitement of wildlife encounters at Jhalana and nearby Amargarh.

## Day-by-Day Safari Highlights:

- Day 1: Afternoon Safari at Jhalana – The adventure began with explorations into the dense jungle terrain.
- Day 2: Morning Safari at Amargarh – A fresh zone revealed the reserve's varied landscapes.
- Day 2: Afternoon Safari at Jhalana – The highlight: Aakhir Ranaji aa he gaye (Finally, Rana has arrived). Positioned at the remote Gatna waterhole with time running out, a radio call alerted us to Rana, Jhalana's majestic leopard star, at Waterhole 1 near the gate. Our driver raced back in a heart-pounding rollercoaster ride, prayers mixed with thrill and caution.
- Day 3: Morning and Afternoon Safaris at Jhalana – Prime sightings included Flora, a stunning female leopard, though the afternoon slot was missed.

**Meet Rana:** The Prince of Jhalana Rana is no ordinary leopard—he is the dominant male of the reserve, often called the “prince” or “king” of Jhalana. In his prime youth, Rana is known for his striking, stylish appearance paired with a calm and fearless demeanor. Local guides describe him as bold and camera-friendly, often giving “darshan” (royal appearances) during early morning or evening safaris. He exudes a regal aura and commands the territory with confidence, embodying the apex predator’s role. Rana’s grace and charisma make him a favorite among wildlife photographers and visitors alike, but his encounters also reveal the delicate balance needed to respect his space in the wild. On our sighting, Rana cautiously avoided drinking at Waterhole 1 because of a close forest department jeep, highlighting the need for ethical wildlife viewing.




**Flora:** Jhalana's Graceful Female Leopard Flora, a beautiful female leopard, was spotted during our morning safari on Day 3.



# Wilderness


**Unforgettable Leopard Sighting:** The Raw Encounter Amid 20-25 jeeps, Rana glided through tall grass matching his height, a vision of power and grace.

Concerns arose when a forest department jeep followed too closely, packed with visitors filming his every move, some even filming other jeeps, posing a disruption to the leopard and wildlife ethics.

Rana skipped drinking water and showed visible signs of stress, often turning to watch the jeep. He eventually slipped through a narrow path and disappeared into the stony habitat of Jhalana, underscoring the need for responsible wildlife tourism.
